Last President's Report, Part Two:

[This is the real, final, last Outlook for 2010/2011 which needs a Presidents report!]

As of today, the budget picture has been somewhat clarified by the Governor's May Revise. For the Community Colleges, there was some good news in that \$350 million has been allocated to the colleges to reduce the present deferral funding of \$961 million.

There are no changes that I have heard to the State Chancellor's Office budget which means that the plan for the library share of TTIP is still there. We won't know if that funding will stay until the actual budget is signed by the Governor but I am hopeful.

Last month, I attended the annual Telecommunications and Technology Advisory Committee (TTAC) retreat and our president-elect Kenley Neufeld joined me. This is the meeting where both annual and long term plans are discussed which are then implemented by the Chancellor's Office. This year, the committee offered ideas and recommendations to the State's Student Success Task Force. The committee's recommendations included the following:

 Change the way that students interact with their educational goals and accomplishments by developing system-level technology tools that map clear academic sequences and support pathways.
Change the way that courses and programs are tracked by building system-wide, customizable solutions that strengthen local capacity to improve access, success, efficiency, and compliance.
Change the way that outcomes are monitored by developing a statewide information system that provides real-time student data to guide decision making. (continued on page 3)

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4) Change the way that online education is delivered by strengthening distance education infrastructure, coordination, and quality controls.

Specifically for libraries, the committee supports the exploration of a statewide systems approach regarding library automation systems. The committee recognizes that the colleges are spending tons of money on lots of systems and that just like for the databases, looking into a systems approach might save money, help in getting the libraries a better voice for better projects and help the libraries in administering and maintaining the systems. Obviously, CCL will be in the middle of any analysis and we will keep you informed of progress.

Finally, I attended the may CIO Board meeting. At the meeting it was announced that Dennis Gervin, Columbia College, will be the new Board President for the academic year 2011-2012 and Mary Kay Rudolph, *Santa Rosa* Junior College, was elected as the new president elect and president for 2012-2013. The CIOs discussed the bill, AB 515 the Extension College idea. It was reported that the legislature might move this idea forward but only as a pilot to determine its feasibility including budget issues, having a two tiered fee structure, and lots of other issues. The board also discussed, SB 1440 the Transfer Degree, where it was reported that the CSU Board voted in its first reading to remove the CSU American Institutions requirement for General Education.

The CIO board created a list of recommendations to the State's Student Success Task Force. The Board's main concern was to support the policy ideas that had either already been supported by research and that any new ideas must also be based on research. They discussed ideas such as mandatory college orientation courses; the conflicting goals of Access and Student Success; seem-less transfer from the K-12 system to community colleges; performance based funding in higher education including both CSU and UC; state funded assessment tools; accelerated learning programs; the 50% law; the Faculty Obligation Number (FON) and the inclusion of librarians and counselors in the FON; the issue of repeatability; the definition of activity courses; whether there should be a State mandated registration priority policy; and finally, whether to require BOG waiver applicants to File FAFSA.

Well, this should be my final president's report. Have a great Summer, I know I will!

NEW INTERFACE FOR NETLIBRARY EBOOKS

The new Netlibrary interface will soon be released from EBSCO. They will release their new interface for Netlibrary ebooks in July (probably the latter part of July but no firm date given). The interface change will <u>automatically</u> switch over. You will not have any choice for the date that this change will be made for your students. Your MARC records will automatically redirect to the new interface for an indefinite period of time. Nothing needs to be done for your catalog records to work. Your students' personal Netlibrary account will not transition over to the new interface. You will want to save any notes in those accounts locally prior to the new release.

Many people are asking about downloading books to mobile devices. You will need Adobe Digital Editions 1.7.1 or higher installed on your computer to download ebooks to your computer. If your administrator has enabled eBook downloads for your institution, you will see a **Download (offline)** link that allows you to check-out and download the eBook and read it on your computer when you are not connected to the Internet, or transfer it to your Adobe Digital Editionscompatible eBook Reader device. EBSCO is currently supporting most of the eReaders except for the Kindle. They do not have an agreement with Amazon yet. The Council of Chief Librarians Executive Board will discuss at their summer meeting if the eBooks in the consortium shared collections will be allowed available for downloads.

40 years of eBooks (Extracted from an infographic by Piotr Kowalczyk)

1971 Michael S. Hart launches Project Gutenberg and digitizes the US Declaration of Independenc, which becomes the first ebook in the world. In March 2011 there were 40,000 produced by Project Gutenberg. This is also the year the first e-mail was sent between two host computers.

1985 The Voyager Company, a pioneer in CD-ROM production is founded.

1993 Digital Book, Inc. offers the first 50 digital books on floppy disks with Digital Book Format (DBF) This is the year Mosaic, the first browser was released.

1998 Rocket Ebook and SoftBook dedicated e-book readers are released.

2000 Stephen King publishes his novella Riding the Bullet as a digital file. In the first 24 hours, ovesr 400,000 copies of his book were downloaded.

2002 Random House and HarperCollins start to sell digital versions of their publications.

2005 Bookboon.com is launched for downloading free textbooks and travel guide e-books.

2007 Amazon launches Kindle in the US with over 90,000 e-Book titles in the Kindle Store.

2008 Europeana, a collection of European digital libraries is launched.

2009 Barnes & Noble introduces the Nook

2010 Apple releases the iPad with iBooks/iBookstore and Google eBookstore opens with 3 million titles. Amazon reports that eBook sales outnumbered print books.

2011 Amazon anounces a partnership with OverDrive to allow patrons to check out eBooks from a library on all Kindle models and platform apps. Kindle library lending is expected to be operational by the end of 2011.
