May Newsletter Article

We held our graduation ceremony at Santa Barbara City College last night and sent off another group of students into the world or other colleges and universities. I'm certain you too will have had (or soon will have) your own campus graduation ceremony. In my 18 years of graduation ceremonies, I've never had a library employee be the student commencement speaker and this year it finally happened. What a treat! We touch so many students on our campuses, but because we don't stand up in front of them week after week, we do not have the same types of relationship as faculty in the classroom. Ours seems to be one in which we build a friendship, and touch different aspects of student life, over a period of years and observe the student growing and changing. This has been my experience and it's always a treat to watch those I know walk across the stage to receive recognition for the accomplishment.

As we head into the summer, I am happy to report the Executive Board for the Council of Chief Librarians has been working diligently to plan activities for 2012-2013 and beyond. We are also keeping our attention on the implementation of the Student Success Task Force recommendations through participation with the Technology and Telecommunications Advisory Committee (TTAC), the California Community Colleges Chief Instructional Officers (CCCCIO) board, and we have requested inclusion on the Basic Skills Summit being planned by the Chancellor's Office this summer. Finally, the Accrediting Commission for Community and Junior Colleges (ACCJC) will be holding a hearing in San Francisco on June 6 to receive comments on revising the Standards (the first time since 2002) and two board members will be attending on our behalf.

The Board will be holding our annual retreat in July with two primary goals. Finalize the workshop activities for the coming year, and secondly, identifying the priorities and strategies for libraries in the 21st century. At this time we have two workshops identified with each workshop happening both in the north and the south in order to reach the maximum number of librarians. The two topics are student learning outcomes assessment and embedded librarians in online instruction. The plan is for September and November, so look for news in early fall. As for the priorities and strategies discussion, we would like to produce a series of white papers or possibly a strategic plan for community college libraries. It's a huge effort that could pay back significant dividends for our libraries.

Gale Virtual Reference Library (GVRL) Text Suppression?

Gale Virtual Reference Library (GVRL) has now been around for six years and Chabot, like most community colleges, has been purchasing individual books and collections in place of their print counterparts. However, Gale has not been forthcoming about the content that is omitted in the online versions of Gale and Gale imprints.

Some Gale ebooks do not include the complete full text. Some searches return this message: "This text has been suppressed due to author restrictions." Chabot has recently found that in its over 300 titles or series in GVRL, 23 of them have missing content totaling 364 documents—all from Gale and Gale imprints. In the document itself the phrase appears for each page where the original print text would be found.

<u>REPORT: ACADEMIC SENATE FOR THE CALIFONIA COMMUNITY</u> COLLEGES (ASCCC)

Librarian Representation on Senate Committees and Other Groups

The work of the Academic Senate is conducted primarily by its standing and ad hoc committees and by its task forces, often augmented by participants from other governance groups. Standing Committees (such as the Curriculum, Equity and Diversity Action, Faculty Development, Occupational Education) are identified in the Academic Senate Bylaws; their work is ongoing from year to year. Ad hoc committees, by contrast, are created in response to a particular issue or concern and, like task forces, generally have a sunset attached to their operation.

If you are interested in serving on a standing, ad hoc, task force, or in other state-wide groups, please complete an <u>Application to Serve at the State Level</u> to indicate your interest.

Yes, the Senate does have a standing committee that librarians might gravitate to----Counseling and Library Faculty Issues---but I would encourage you to consider stating interest in the other committees, task groups, advisory committees, etc. to which the Senate appoints faculty. There is the need for the knowledge and expertise that librarians can bring to a wide variety of issues---accreditation, basic skills, curriculum, diversity, student learning outcomes and assessment, and technology. Spring Plenary Session

The Academic Senate held its Spring Plenary Session at the SFO Westin from April 19-21. There were a number of librarians there as senate presidents and other leadership roles. In addition to several days of breakouts, the Senate delegates also

adopt resolutions that guide the work of the Senate. These are available on the front page of the Senate website at <u>www.asccc.org</u>.

Two of the adopted resolutions should be of special interest to librarians.

Effective Practices for Providing California Community College Library Resources and Services to Online Students (Resolution 2.02)

Whereas, Fully online and hybrid course offerings by California community colleges are continuing to increase; and access to library resources and availability of library services for students taking fully online and hybrid courses varies across California community college libraries;

Whereas, Accreditation Standard II.C.1 requires that "the institution supports the quality of its instructional programs by providing library and other learning support services that are sufficient in quantity, currency, depth, and variety to facilitate educational offerings, regardless of location or means of delivery";

Whereas, The absence of best practices on how to most effectively and efficiently meet the library portion of accreditation Standard II.C.1 leaves many California community college libraries uncertain regarding how to properly make available library resources and services to students taking fully online and hybrid courses; and

Whereas, Librarians are the faculty uniquely equipped to understand the issues related to the delivery of online library resources and services, and the funding necessary to meet the library resource needs of the community colleges has been inadequate;

Resolved, That the Academic Senate for California Community Colleges consult with community college library faculty to research and make available practices for how California community college libraries can best provide library resources and services to effectively and efficiently meet the library portion of accreditation Standard II.C.1 and support the success of students taking fully online and hybrid courses; and

Resolved, That the Academic Senate for California Community Colleges work with the Chancellor's Office to identify and ensure adequate funding is made available for California community college libraries to provide library resources and services to students taking fully online and hybrid courses.

Some 70 % of all cell phone owners and 86% of smartphone owners have used their phones in the previous 30 days to perform at least one of the following activities:

- Solve an unexpected problem that they or someone else had encountered -- 35% have used their phones to do this in the past 30 days.
- Decide whether to visit a business, such as a restaurant -- 30% have used their phone to do this in the past 30 days.
- Find information to help settle an argument they were having -- 27% have used their phone to get information for that reason in the past 30 days.
- Look up a score of a sporting event -- 23% have used their phone to do that in the past 30 days.

THE UNCONFERENCE: COMMUNITY COLLEGE ISSUES

A great group of colleagues gathered May 5th at Santa Barbara City College (SBCC) to share experiences and expertise from community college libraries in California at an "UNCONFERENCE."* None of us having attended an Unconference, we didn't know what to expect. But it was a energizing day of collaborating, problem solving, and forming new partnerships. There were a broad range of topics we each cared about, discussed in an intimate setting; we could go deeper into topics than we could at a larger conference. There wasn't even much talk about the state budget crisis. In fact, there was a good deal of laughter, an ocean view, and even a little hula-hoopin'!

Librarians at SBCC conceived this day to provide a place for colleagues from around the state to connect and to share common concerns and creative solutions for working with our distinct student populations. There were no specific limitations on the topics to be discussed at the Unconference as long as they in some way touched upon community college librarianship.

Given limitations on travel and conference money, we made the day free to attend.

We even found willing SBCC faculty and staff to host attendees in their homes. 32 librarians -- from Santa Rosa to near San Diego -- arrived eager to participate. We rolled up our sleeves to make the event as low-cost as possible. Two SBCC librarians made home-made treats for the morning snack. Once the library opened for the day, we worked around students and held sessions in several library spaces. An eager student culinary club agreed to have a bake sale for the afternoon snack, and participants were asked to bring their own name badges and paper. Oh, and we had recess, since it was a gloriously beautiful day outdoors.

The topics discussed and presented were driven by those in attendance. When registering, attendees were asked about their willingness to give a short presentation or facilitate a topic discussion. A week before the Unconference, attendees ranked the offered topic discussion choices and we selected the top-ranked 7 discussion topics. There was enough space, and time, to allow each librarian who wanted to make an individual presentation to do so.

By hosting this event, we learned what makes an Unconference successful: keep it simple for the organizers and the attendees, and keep it full of opportunities for participation. Most participants wished the day had been longer, with more opportunity to delve into other topics which arose spontaneously during the day. The enthusiasm extended to last question of the day: "when can we do this again?" Participants surveyed after the event unanimously voted to have a second Unconference (and make it annual!).

*What is an Unconference? The ALA definition: "An unconference is a participant-guided

experience that actually brings the unstructured conversations people usually have between conference sessions into the conference itself. Unlike most conferences where a group of leaders determine what will be discussed, the participants make those decisions at an unconference, and usually either on the day of the unconference or shortly before.

Also sponsored by Target were the bookmarks that librarians handed out to assist children in recollecting their library visit amid the dizzying array of live demonstrations, interactive learning opportunities, and free brown bag lunches in the quad.
